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## 1) Brexit

### A) Nestlé reveals stockpiling plans

Nestlé has joined the growing number of food and drink manufacturers stockpiling products ahead of Brexit, as it warns of the “severe consequences” of a no-deal Brexit.

Speaking at a Business, Energy and Industrial Committee meeting yesterday (28 November), Nestlé corporate communications director Ian Rayson told MPs the company had been stockpiling products it needed to import into the UK and the reverse in Europe.

However, it warned that warehouses for frozen and chilled food were nearly full and its ability to stockpile more food was limited by factory capacity and storage space, as well as the fact that some ingredients had a limited shelf-life.

### b) No hope for frictionless trade post-Brexit

There will be no hope for frictionless trade between the UK and the EU post-Brexit, according to a leaked document.

The 26-page political declaration – seen by *The Guardian* – proposed a trading agreement on goods as close as possible, but the UK and the EU would be separate markets with “*inevitable barriers to trade*”.

### C) UK Government reaffirms commitment to review loaf labelling and marketing laws – after Brexit

A letter from Michael Gove, Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) to the Real Bread Campaign – which has been lobbying for the Honest Crust Act – stated that Defra will look into the bread and flour regulations once the UK leaves the EU.

### D) Brexit ‘legislative tsunami’ threatens food law

The threat of a “legislative tsunami” in the wake of Brexit could leave the food industry lacking consistency across regulations, according to an expert in food law.

Dominic Watkins, head of food law at DWF, said it was key for the UK to integrate EU laws into domestic laws to provide consistency for manufacturers. However, the sheer scale of the number of laws that needed to be transferred could prove difficult, he added.

*Something like 95% of food law comes from the EU and the vast majority of that is in regulation.*

## 2) Diet and health

### a) Edible insects in the EU: the long road to legalisation

Edible insects are covered by the EU's novel food regulation - but none have yet made it to the list of authorised novel foods. Legal experts from Keller and Heckman Katia Merten-Lentz and Caroline Commandeur weigh in on the the legal status of edible insects in Europe.

The importance of proteins in daily diet is now widely recognised across the world. In this context, insect consumption could be an answer.

However, the marketing of edible insects within EU remained a sensitive issue for a long time. The legal gap on their status was only filled in 2015, with the adoption and update of the Novel Food Regulation, applicable since 2018.

## 3) Food Fraud

### a) 'Trawler net' fraud detection system launched

A system for detecting adulteration in food and preventing fraud has been developed by UK authentication and testing provider Food Forensics.

Next Generation Sequencing (NGS) allows testers to identify and validate multiple species in products such as seafood, dried mushrooms or ready meals.

Unlike a targeted system of identification that looks for a specific species, NGS uses a "trawler net" approach to capture as much gene data as possible.

NGS is the first testing available to test for the 'unknown unknowns', claimed Food Forensics.

## 5) Ethical and Sustainability

### a) Traceability 'from seed to plate': Auchan rolling out blockchain internationally

French retailer Auchan is planning an international launch for blockchain technology in its supply chain.

Auchan, which conducted initial tests in Vietnam in partnership with German start-up Te-Food, said that it will introduce the technology to its operations in France, Italy, Spain, Portugal and Senegal.

*"From seed to plate, information on all stages of a product's life is now available to consumers in a fully transparent manner,"* the company said.

### **b) RSPO suspends FGV palm oil mill and four plantations over labour rights abuses**

The Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO) has suspended the membership of one mill and four plantations belonging to Malaysian palm oil giant FGV, which supplies manufacturers including Nestle and Mars, due to labour rights abuses.

The complaint against FGV (formerly known as FELDA) was filed by the *Wall Street Journal* back in 2015 following an article alleging the use of forced labour and poor working conditions on FGV-owned plantations as well as unfair wages.

RSPO described the complaint as “*a matter of public interest*”. Its complaints panel carried out an investigation that included an independent verification visit in April this year.

## **6) Nutrition**

### **a) ‘Helping consumers make the right choices’: PepsiCo trials traffic light labelling in Europe**

PepsiCo revealed today (28 November) that it will trial the introduction of traffic light nutritional labelling, already implemented in the UK and Ireland, across other European markets after it suspended its involvement in the Evolved Nutrition Label (ENL) scheme.

PepsiCo decided to opt for the traffic light labels rather than the NutriScore system, which has been adopted in France, Belgium and Spain.

### **b) Got the green light: ‘We’ve listened and now we’re acting’ – Kellogg’s to finally put ‘traffic light’ health labels on UK cereals**

Kellogg’s will introduce traffic light labeling on most of its cereals sold in the UK next year.

The company is finally taking steps to use the voluntary system, which was officially adopted by the UK government in 2013 to help consumers make healthier food choices.

Traffic light labels show whether levels of sugar, salt and fat are high, medium or low using red, amber and green traffic light colours, based on the amount per 100g.

## **7) Salt and Sugar**

### **a) UK sugar tax: £154m raised since introduction**

The UK’s sugar tax has raised £153.8m since its introduction in April, according to figures from HM Revenue & Customs.

The Soft Drinks Industry Levy (SDIL) is predicted to raise £240m (\$308m, €271m) in its first year; and the figures show that £153.8m (\$197m, €174m) has been raised over the first seven months.

## 8) Advertising and Labelling

### a) 'A stark and potent symbol of the effects of deforestation': The row over Iceland's palm oil Christmas ad

A row has erupted after advertising regulator Clearcast refused to approve UK retailer Iceland's Christmas advertising campaign focusing on the impact of palm oil production on deforestation for broadcast.

The advert, featuring a baby orangutan, was produced in partnership with environmental campaign group Greenpeace.

Iceland said the advert was "*banned*" because the critique of palm oil was deemed "*too political*" by Clearcast, the body responsible for pre-approving adverts on behalf of broadcasters in the UK. Clearcast insisted that this publicity is a "*misunderstanding of the issue*" and stressed that it's responsibility is to uphold advertising regulations.

### b) The UK advertising watchdog has reversed a previous decision to ban an advert for Kellogg's Coco Pops Granola following an independent review.

Kellogg's Coco Pops granola is not high in fat, salt and sugar (HFSS), but the granola advert featured the Coco Pops brand mascot Coco the Monkey.

The UK's Advertising Standards Authority (ASA) ruled that because viewers were likely to associate the Coco Pops monkey with the brand's other high sugar versions, it was in breach of the advertising code.

Under the UK Code of Broadcast Advertising (BCAP), adverts for products that are high in fat, salt and sugar must not be broadcast around TV programmes that commissioned for, principally directed at or likely to appeal to audiences below the age of 16.

### c) 'Patchy' roll-out of WHO advice on junk food marketing

European uptake of World Health Organisation (WHO) recommendations on junk food marketing to children has been "patchy" in part because of intense private sector lobbying, according to a WHO report.

In May 2010, the World Health Assembly unanimously adopted World Health Organisation (WHO) recommendations on the marketing of foods and non-alcoholic beverages to children.

The recommendations aim to stem the rising rates of childhood obesity by reducing the impact of marketing junk food – foods that are high in fat, salt and sugar (HFSS) – on children.

#### **d) Pret allergen death sparks new law calls**

A change in on-pack labelling laws is gathering support following the death of a 15-year-old who ate a product containing an undeclared allergen bought from a Pret A Manager outlet.

There needed to be a “*change of culture*” in businesses, regulation and enforcement, so that people with allergies could readily find the information they needed to keep safe, said the Institute of Food Science & Technology (IFST).

*“It’s increasingly likely the Government will remove the ‘pre-packed for direct’ classification from regulations, meaning all types of food in packaging will be required to declare any allergens on-pack, rather than providing it orally or by a sign as the law currently allows,”*

### **9) Food Safety**

#### **a) FSA: England less capable to deal with food standards issues**

Local authorities (LAs) in England are less capable to deal with food standards issues than their equivalents in Northern Ireland and Wales, according to a new report.

A survey conducted by the Food Standards Agency (FSA) found resources in England were generally lower, with 22% of English LAs having less than one full-time equivalent person dedicated to food standards work.

#### **b) Meat cutting plant fined £43,000 for hygiene offences**

A Birmingham-based meat cutting plant has been fined over £43,000 for food hygiene offences. Sandwell Foods, which trades under the name Halal World, was found guilty in Birmingham Magistrates Court on four charges of food hygiene breaches.

According to the Food Standards Agency (FSA), officials initially worked with the business in order to achieve improvements after identifying a number of failings. However, the resultant increase in audits and inspections found further breaches between June and August 2017, which led to legal action being taken.

#### **c) Commission puts on hold plans to relax mercury levels in fish**

The European Commission has put on hold plans to increase maximum authorised mercury levels in fish, a move welcomed by consumer rights campaigners.

Currently, maximum authorised levels are set at one milligram per kilogram of fish and the Commission had planned on doubling this to two milligrams.

#### **d) EFSA lowers safe level for toxic dioxins and PCBs**

The European Food Safety Authority (EFSA) has lowered the tolerable intake level for the toxic contaminants, dioxins and PCBs.

Although their presence in food and feed has been falling since the 1980s thanks to public efforts, both dioxins and PCBs persist in the environment for years and accumulate at low levels in the food chain, usually by building up in the fatty tissue of animals.

The biggest contributors to dietary exposure in European countries are fish, especially fatty fish, cheese and livestock meat.

#### **10) Origin**

##### **a) Poland to bring in mandatory origin labelling for potatoes**

Poland has announced plans to bring in mandatory country of origin labelling for fresh potatoes. The rules apply to fresh potatoes, sold loose or packed, but not processed potatoes.

Poland's Ministry for Agriculture and Rural Development notified the European Commission of its intention to bring in the rules last week.

According to the text of the draft law, consumers are "*confused*" by current EU labelling provisions that require obligatory country of origin labelling for certain categories of fresh fruit and vegetables but not potatoes.
